All activities at Amanjena are designed to provide inspiration, with the possibility to personalise each encounter for a fully bespoke experience.



Cultural Discoveries

The ever-vibrant city of Marrakech stands at Morocco's beating heart – a sensory place where quiet, contemplative mosques and artistimagined gardens coexist with piled-high produce, hand-hewn pottery and a symphony of sights and sounds that together offer an insight into local life.

Whether enjoying lunch in the remote villages of the Atlas Mountains or unearthing ancient treasures in the exotic stalls of the souks, this culturally rich city continually excites the imagination.



Marrakech through the Ages by Foot

This historical walk begins at the intricately carved gate of Bab Agnaou, hiding princely tombs, ornamented with some of the finest examples of Moroccan-Andalusian decorative art.

Next, stroll through the ornate gate and evocative ruins of 12th-century El Badia Palace, commissioned in 1578 by the sultan Ahmad al-Mansur of the Saadian dynasty, before exploring the spice markets of the Jewish quarter and arriving at well-preserved, 19th-century Bahia Palace, formerly used as the French governor's residence, which today offers a tranquil antidote to the surrounding streets.

For the final stop, visit the stately 19th-century former home of Sultan Dar Si Said, now the Museum of Moroccan Art, housing some of the finest collections of jewellery, carpets, green and earth toned pottery, leatherwork and oil lamps in a host of exhibits that reveal a fascinating insight into days gone by.



Le Jardin Secret

Located in Marrakech's Medina, Le Jardin Secret once simmered with exotic stories of sultans, before falling into ruin and disrepair. Restored and reopened to the public in 2016 for the first time in its history, guests today can trace its origins back to the Saadian Dynasty, more than 400 years ago, admiring its two riad-style buildings, with their earthen and tadelakt-plastered walls, palm-lined walkways and tranquil marble-carved pools. A fine example of expert Moroccan craftsmanship that has fittingly acted as the home of Morocco most important political figures over the years.

Le Jardin Rouge

Created by the Montresso* Art Foundation, Le Jardin Rouge artistic residence and gardens has supported the research of international artists for nearly 10 years. Located on the olivelined road to Fez, eight studios welcome nearly 30 artists each cultural season, encouraging experimentation, dialogue and the cultivation of a unique creative laboratory. Presentations of projects are regularly organised within the Helmet Room, as artists discuss their work with the public, answer interviews with journalists and decipher their creations with critics.

Anima Garden

A 40-minute drive from Amanjena, artist André Heller's opulent, two-acre botanical garden is an unforgettable experience. Visitors stroll along shady paths, between precious trees and shrubs, flowers and fragrances, pavilions and sculptures, discovering North African nature with an intoxicating view of the mountains from its location in the Ourika Valley.





Mindful Ceramic Workshop

In a hand-building ceramics workshop with an artisan designer, explore the basics of working with clay, focusing on mindfulness. This experience offers a calming and physical way to relax the mind and unlock inner peace, by learning primal techniques used by Morocco's ancient ancestors. The two-hour session includes guided foundational steps, followed by time to immerse yourself in your own creative practice, focusing on the tactile hands-on experience.

Stargazing

Embark on a celestial journey to explore the wonders of the night sky. Guided by a knowledgeable astronomer, gaze at the stars, marvel at the moon and discover distant planets. Using state-of-the-art telescopes and equipment, dive into the mysteries of the universe, uncovering hidden constellations and celestial displays. Whether a seasoned stargazer or new to astronomy, this experience offers a captivating and unforgettable glimpse at the cosmos.



Active Adventures

Morocco's great outdoors provide boundless space for freedom, unlimited opportunity for adventure and moments of historical and cultural discovery, all viewed through the prism of nature. With Amanjena as a base, climb the Atlas Mountains, traverse the Agafay Desert and explore the city's intrigue-laced backstreets to reconnect the mind, body and soul.





Sidecar Experience

See the backstreets of Marrakech from the backseat of an open-air sidecar. An enthralling way to navigate the city's labyrinthine souks and surrounding streets, this experience offers two possible routes: one through the Medina, Gueliz and the Palmeraie; the other to Dar el Sadaka, a sculpture park by French visual artist, Jean-François Fourtou, with the chance to see the Medina or Gueliz, depending on where the adventure ends. Steered by an expert local guide, each route takes roughly 3.5 hours, revealing the city's hidden corners with every twist and turn.

The tour starts at 9.00am or 2.30pm.



Kasbah Toubkal in the High Atlas

Rising from the sands of the Sahara to the 4,167-metre top of Jbel Toubkal – North Africa's highest peak – the Atlas Mountains are one of the world's most dramatic ranges. From Amanjena, the peaks are reachable in around 90 minutes.

Pass the villages of Tahanaout and Asni, through steep pine and cedar forests, freshwater streams, fruit plantations and fertile valleys, before beginning the exciting ascent to Toubkal. Tackle it by car or foot, and enjoy a backpack picnic lunch, prepared by the Amanjena team, with panoramic views from 1,800 metres above sea level.

Various guided walks, from half-hour strolls to four-hour treks, are available to reach the Kasbah, along with a leisurely ride on a mule through the village trail, shaded by chestnut trees.

Hot-air Ballooning

Embark on the airborne adventure to discover the beauty of Marrakech's landscapes while gracefully crossing the skies by hot-air balloon. The journey departs from Amanjena taking flight from the North Palmeraie, from where you can see the valley of the Oued Tensift, the Douars of Rahmna, Oulad El Garn and the mountains of Ibilets.

On good-visibility days, you can see a panorama of the Atlas Mountains. A journey to remember, giving yourself the gift of peace and freedom as you take in the expansive beauty of nature from bird's-eye view.

Golf

Marrakech is one of the most reliable golf destinations in the world, with sunshine and blue skies providing the perfect conditions for a morning or afternoon of play. Just minutes from Amanjena, four varied courses stand beautifully framed by the Atlas Mountains, with welcome shade provided by groves of olive and palm trees.

A short putt away from the resort is Amelkis Golf Club, while Marrakech Royal Golf Club is located less than two minutes away. Also nearby is Assoufid Golf Club, an easy 30-minute drive. All courses are challenging enough for pros, yet manageable for beginners. Amanjena also offers the opportunity for children and adults to practice their skills with a view over the hotel's Olive Grove.



Amelkis

Completed in 2008, Amelkis has a resort feel with an openview course and sand and water traps. The original course features 18 holes with a par of 72 and the Menara course consists of nine holes with a par of 36.

The Royal Golf Club

Built in the early 1920s, The Royal Golf Club bears a more traditional, narrow design, with lush vegetation offering beautiful shady gardens and an 18-hole golf course.

Al Madeen Golf Course

An 18-hole championship course that spans 72 hectares, with a par of 72. It bears the signature of the famous architect Kyle Phillips who has blended the design with a Moroccan and Scottish elements.

The Assoufid Golf Club

Designed by Neil Cameron and named after the nearby village, the World Golf Awards crowned this club Morocco's Best Golf Course in 2015.



LUX Tennis Academy

Amanjena partners with LUX Tennis Academy who provide private tennis coaching and clinics on the resort's clay court. Hosted by professional ATP or WTA players, the academy offers personalised programmes adapted for each guest, based on ability and age.

Surrounded by the resort's private gardens, Amanjena's Petanque Court also provides further opportunity for guests of all ages to experience friendly competition with this classic garden game.

La Perle aux Oiseaux Wildlife Refuge

3 Hectares, 450 animals

Born from a common passion, the creation of La Perle Aux Oiseaux is the direct result of one couple's dedication to animals and their protection.

The goal of the reserve is to safeguard native bird species by reintroducing them into their natural environment. Once they are ready to go back to the wild, they are released. Species that cannot be freed are taken care of by La Perle aux Oiseaux and its owners, Salma and Salim. Visit the wildlife refuge with your children to learn about its history via guided tours and support if you can.






Family Yoga

You will walk from the foothills on winding paths for 45 minutes to 2.5 hours, based on the preferences of the guests, guided by the eldest son of the family to their traditional home. Here, there's time to enjoy an authentic Berber lunch and tea, immersed in local hospitality, and explore the village and surrounding beauty of the mountains at your own pace. At the end, choose to walk back down to the car, via a 20-minute shortcut, or arrangements can be made in advance for a village pick up by car.


Amanjena's Caidal Tent

Traditionally, caidal tents were used by Moroccan dignitaries as they travelled across the desert. At Amanjena, an ornately decorated caidal, set amid the olive groves, provides the atmospheric backdrop for candlelit dinners and special- occasion feasts, accompanied by live Moroccan music, belly dancers and snake charmers for a night to remember.

Afternoon Tea

Morocco's tradition of tea dates back to the 12th century BC and endures today as a symbol of home-spun hospitality. There are various theories on the origin of tea in Morocco, that Berbers (also known as the Amazigh) imported theirs from Asia, or that Queen Anne introduced tea to the Moroccan sultan as a ploy to release British prisoners.

Served overlooking our iconic Bassin, Amanjena's afternoon tea offers a delightful Moroccan version of high tea in a regal setting. Indulge in a cup of refreshing herbal or mint tea, accompanied by delicious delicacies, crafted by Amanjena's pastry chef.



Agafay Desert Dining Experience

During the warmer months, as the sun sets against the backdrop of the Atlas Mountains, embark on a camel journey across the lunar-like desert to a secret destination. It is a wonderful and unique experience. You will depart from Amanjena in the evening, drive to Agafay (a 45 to 60-minute drive), and ride camels to our private camp. Here, a private Amanjena tent awaits, ready to serve a traditional Berber dinner beneath the stars, allowing you to gase up at constellations once used for navigation and storytelling.

This activity is subject to weather conditions and may be cancelled on short notice.

Further Afield

While the invigorating pace of Marrakech promises to keep visitors endlessly entertained, Morocco also offers a world beyond the city walls. Further afield, charming coastal towns, dune-topped deserts and hidden villages await – each offering their own taste of the country's varied and vibrant culture. Whether travelling with family, friends or for a romantic escape, Amajena's team is on hand to ensure every experience is unique and tailored to you.



Essaouira

Around two and a half hours from Amanjena, Essaouira is a beautiful old walled city and colourful fishing port where whitewashed buildings are nudged by electric blue boats.

Visit the Medina, with its slower-paced souks, before taking in the Skala de Ville ramparts for a wonderful view of the Atlantic, as well as offshore Ile Mogador.

Lunch can be taken at one of the town's many restaurants or portside fish stalls, where fresh grilled fish is served daily.

After lunch, a long walk along the beach or slow camel ride beside the sea beckons. Otherwise, there are numerous cafes, artist studios and bazaars to discover, or the peaceful beach of Sidi Kaouki, a short 20-minute drive away. Those with plenty of energy may also want to try their hand at windsurfing, before venturing back to the secluded solace of Amanjena.

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
